

SHARKS IN OUR ESTUARY



There are over a dozen species of sharks that swim in the waters of Tampa Bay. Though sharks are considered primarily marine animals, they are still found in brackish, estuarine waters. Like many other animals sharks use the estuary environment as a place to have their young. Young sharks are protected within the various habitats of the estuary and have an abundant supply of food. Some of the most common sharks found in our estuary are blacktip, bonnethead, bull, hammerhead, and spinner sharks.

The shortfin make is the fastest shark clocking in at bursts of speeds of 46 miles per hour.


60 FT
