Thank you for reaching out to the Buzzards Bay Coalition with the opportunity to assist with a shootline hundreds of lobeter traps, rope and buoys which ring the island

The impacts of fishing gear debris on wildlife and natural habitats are well documented. Wire lobates traps are known to insovertently catch and kill small animals and birds when left untended (both on land and at sea), and plastic ropes, busys and wire coating contribute microplastics to any environment as they degrade. Removal of this harmful dobels would benefit the birds and mammals which live on

As a partner in this removal effort, we would invite our volunteers to participate with your removal team. Once you identify the specific dates, we can broadcast the opportunity to assist widely, on the island and mainland. Our volunteers know the shoreline very well and would be prepared to help drug load, and haul the debris safely over the eart paths back to the serting location. This type of work has not been undertaken before, so we don't know exactly what the needs will be; but we look forward to helping develop a norm offort that can be successful.

Letter of Authorization

In accordance with authority granted to the Director of the Division of Marine Fisheries at 322 CMR 7.01(4)(d), and Chapter 130 Sections 17 (2) and (3), this letter permits you to retrieve and eastern Cape Cod as part of an ongoing study and cooperative project.

As you know, the increased use of plastics in fishing gear has resulted in persistent marine debris that in some areas has littered the ocean floor and shorelines and causes mortality to some marine species. Your work to identify and in some cases retrieve the derelict fishing gear will add to our knowledge base and contribute to future policies and rules that may mitigate or prevent

The following conditions are established as part of this letter of authorization:

- 1. This letter or copies of this letter must in possession of anyone retrieving fishing gear
- 2. No fishing gear properly marked with a surface system may be removed from the water
- 3. All traps and nets and associated components, including buoys, removed from the water or the shoreline shall be - to the degree possible - inventoried and described regarding gear type. fishery, and owner; a report of gear retrieved and its disposition shall be submitted to DMF
- 4. Any buoys that are intact may be returned to the owners based on the permit number and identification of the permit holders from the list furnished to you by DMF

The Cuttybunk Island Artists' Residency draws artists from around the country to our smal island for one week in June each year, where they may immerse in the beauty and nature of

Some of our surroundings, however, include fishing gear that has been pushed up onto ou shoreline by storms, contributing to a completely un-natural setting in an otherwise

We are familiar with the issue of lobster gear deposited on the shore, and we are aware there are artists who work with the debris as their medium of choice. In discussions with you last fall, we envisioned that our week-long artists' residency, which normally nmodates a dozen painters, could also accommodate 2-4 marine debris artists, and w share your belief that there would be great interest in the opportunity to participate.

We can conceive of the residency in such a way that our group of landscape painters and the artists working with marine debris could have the opportunity to engage with each other, learn about each other's work, and share ideas. We imagine a beautiful pairing of sculptural work, resulting from working with the fishing gear debris, and paintings of the island produced by fellow artists, shown together at a public art show at the end of the

Thank you for contacting me regarding your proposal to secure funding for ghost gear removal from Cuttyhunk Island. Working with you these past two years on your Cape Cod Bay derelict fishing gea project has been the inspiration for my newest course offering, "MUS 1213 Music on the Brain Spring Break Field Study - Whale Conservation and Marine Stewardship: April 2-8, 2023," designed to be he over spring break so that up to 15 undergraduate students could travel to Massachusetts and collaborat with the Center for Coastal Studies on your annual Ghost Gear Removal Program. While we originally had proposed the field trip to Provincetown, immersion in the issue on Cuttyhunk will offer students a even greater opportunity to expand their critical engagement in course material through a deep exploration of marine habitat and anthropogenic environmental impact as part of a community-engage

The course is designed so that students will work directly with CCS to remove ghost gear, learn from scientists and fishermen about the complex network of issues impacting marine conservation efforts in Cape Cod and Buzzards Bay, and ultimately create a multi-media project focused on creative response and practical solutions to share with the public. I fully understand that music, art, and volunteer labor cannot alone solve the issue of ghost gear, but it is my fervent hope that collaborations such as this, with education and public outreach at its core, will reach a wider audience, assist with good work, and perhap build friendships and understanding where none existed previously.

I truly hope your proposal is a success and that we meet you at the ferry in New Bedford next April.

Over the past several years we have received regular complaints from residents on Cuttyhunk regarding the derelict fishing gear accumulating on the shoreline of Cuttyhunk Island.

In the fall of 2021, I slerted Laura Ludwig, Manager of the Marine Debris and Plastics Program at the

Ms. Ludwig has managed a successful derelict fishing gear recovery program in Cape Cod Bay for many years, and our agency has assisted with many aspects of the program including gear identification and industry outreach, as part of protecoils developed in conjunction with MA DMF.

On October 18, 2021, we escorted Ms. Ludwig to Cuttyhunk to estimate the feasibility of removing the abundant lost, abundened and discarded lobster traps and associated gear (ghost gear). The island's coastline is regularly impacted by ghost gear being brought to shore by storm and tide action remove the debris at the foot of cliffs and on boulder-strewn shores.

With support from the Southeast New England Grants program, and in-kind support from island assets and this agency, we are confident that the Center for Coastal Studies will execute a success! and important debris removal exercise in the spring of 2023. We support the proposal by Ms. Ludwig and look forward to assisting as needed.

We expect to assist with gear handling and processing twice during the project's duration, incurring a contribution of two round trips from New Bedford at a rate of \$1500 each.
